The 48th Fighter
Wing provides
worldwide responsive

The 48th Fighter Wing – also known as the Liberty Wing – is located at RAF Lakenheath and RAF Feltwell. Consisting of more than 5,000 U.S. military members, over 1,500 British and U.S. civilians, and around 8,500 dependents, it is the largest U.S.-operated Air Force base in the United Kingdom and home to both F-15E and F-35A fighter jets. Current priorities for the 48th Fighter Wing include doubling our F-35A fleet by 2024 and providing balance for our people.



Historically, the 48th FW has been the foundation of USAFE's combat capability and remains so today. The Liberty Wing led the EI Dorado Caryon roids into Libyu in 1986 and was the first F-111 fighter unit to deploy to the Gulf during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. The Liberty Wing also anchored NATO forces during Operations Deliberate Force and Allied Force. Since September 11, 2001, the 48th FW has played a key role in antiterrorism operations, flying combat missions, and providing combat support in Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqui Freedom.

One of the most fundamental roles of a school is to listen – something that can of course happen in many different ways. It could be school leaders listening to their staff or staff members listening to their pupils. And it can also be a school listening to their parents and community about things that are going well and things that could be improved.

As Chair of Governors at West Row Academy, I never underestimate the power of listening. This was never more apparent than our recent school surveys, and we thank every pupil, staff member, parent and family who took the time to let us know their views. Every single voice is important as we continue our journey of improvement and continue to make the school a proud heartbeat of our community.

There were so many positives in the survey and it was clear that our pupils, staff and parents feel we are moving in the right direction. But we are not there yet. The school, under Headteacher Elisabeth Close, has put in a programme of improvements and so some of the survey answers were no surprise to us. The survey is an important document and one that shows the school is listening.

Every day, I see school staff that are working so hard to make a difference to young lives at West Row Academy. For instance, the school has started a priority reading list, something that has further enhanced the culture of reading both in the classroom and at home. It is essential that pupils are able to read fluently and with confidence to ensure they have the best foundations to be ready for secondary school learning and the necessary tools for life.

You may have also seen in the local newspaper that our early years provision has begun benefiting from a brand-new outdoor learning area.



The outdoor play area was funded by Unity Schools Partnership, of which West Row is a member school, and completed over the Easter holidays. Mrs Close, and everyone connected with West Row Academy, believe one of the things that sets our school apart is the outdoor space with large playground and playing field. In Mrs Close's words: "This improved area for our youngest pupils is a fantastic addition to compliment all our outdoor learning opportunities. Our children have already been benefiting from using it." The fantastic space will support pupil development in all areas of learning and it will be exciting to see the outcomes in our children's development.

I intend to keep your regularly updated with news and developments at the Academy.

As we approach the summer, I am reminded of just how important different professional opportunities are or what experiences can be available for young people of all ages. Recognising just how important these opportunities can be for young people's professional development, I wanted to highlight how these can be applied. Starting with encouraging the next generation to learn more about gardening from the fantastic resource in "the shed", this community resource allows individuals to see what its volunteers are growing and how they support their community. Organisations and charities with similar goals to the shed also provide a plethora of resources that other youth groups such as scouts and guides associations can also access free resources that they can use not only to encourage young people to work towards their various badges and awards but also can link it to other organisations which they can place on CVs and applications. Project and activity resources from Jane Goodall's Roots and Shoots programs can support anything land and environment-related.

The surrounding schools can also work with charitable organisations such as the Brilliant Club to bring in research students to work at the schools. These researchers then deliver sessions to the students for seven weeks, during which they speak about various topics for both primary and high school students. This gives them opportunities to learn from researchers and learn more about university and academia. The students can also have the opportunity to receive their certificate of completion of their programme at a leading UK university. A similar charity, Young Enterprise, also has a fantastic programme for students to learn about entrepreneurship. Young Enterprise provides experiential learning opportunities, with the support of volunteers from various industry sectors, enabling young individuals to acquire practical skills essential for navigating life after formal education and entering the workforce. This organisation focuses on equipping young people with skills, knowledge, and abilities in eight critical employability competencies. These competencies aim to facilitate successful transitions for these individuals into further education, employment, or training opportunities. Some other resources are available from Community Action Suffolk for other volunteer opportunities.



AROUND THE ALLOTMENTS **IN JULY AND AUGUST**



The summer months have finally arrived and, despite the horrible wet weather we have had throughout spring, hopefully we are experiencing some nice warm weather and good growing conditions for both allotments and gardens.

Strawberries and soft fruits such as raspberries and gooseberries should be cropping well and it's a good idea to keep them netted for some protection against birds. If you have plenty to spare, soft fruits can be frozen for use in the winter and to make tasty homemade jams and preserves.



A helpful website with lots of recipes can be found at https://www.bbcgoodfood.com/ recipes/collection/jam-recipes. It's important to keep vegetables well-watered which will help Strawberry: Camberly: to promote good growth, healthy plants and well-laden crops. In the latter part of the summer, strawberry plant runners can be planted ready for next year's crop

Now is the time to set crops such as winter cabbages and winter greens ready for harvesting in the colder months. Netting the small plants will help to limit damage by pigeons and other pests until the plants have time to get established. It's a good idea to maintain regular cleaning and weeding of the allotment or garden which will not only help the plants grow stronger and healthier but will also help to keep pests such as slugs and snails at bay. Crops such beetroot, peas, Swiss chard and turnips can be directly sown into the soil.

Keep a close eye out for potato blight which can also spread to tomato plants as they are in the same family. If you do find potato blight it is best to dig up and dispose of the infected plants to try and stem the disease before it spreads. More detailed information and images of plants with potato blight can be found at https://www.rhs.org.uk/disease/potato-blight. It's a good idea to pinch out the top and side shoots of outdoor tomato plants, usually when you can see four to five trusses. In August/September onions can be dried outside in sunny weather but if it's wet it is best to dry them indoors to prevent rot.



By mid-July to August, it should be time to harvest crops such as sweetcorn, runner beans and French/dwarf beans along with courgette, marrows and aubergines. Salad veg such as lettuce, cucumber, radishes, tomatoes and beetroot should also be cropping well, ready for tasty summer salads. A recipe for Braised



From the Pastor's Desk

The Olympic Games will shortly be upon us and many of us will once again be glued to the TV as we watch the amazing athletes in their craft. While the Gold Medalists take center stage, sometimes the wonderful acts of sportsmanship and kindness only filter through sometime later, if at all. There is the story of Henry Pearce of Australia, who was competing in the single scull rowing event at the 1928 Olympics. He was leading when a duck and her string of ducklings came into view up ahead. They were on a collision course and Pearce reckoned that his scull would cut the string in two and sink a few ducklings in the process, so he pulled in his oars. When the ducks passed, Pearce again bent his back to the task. There's a happy ending to the story. Pearce won. Usually, acts of kindness in sport result in defeat.

Remember Leo Durocher's pronouncement, "Nice guys finish last"? It happened a number of years ago in the marathon tandem kayak racing event at the world championships in Copenhagen. Danish paddlers were leading when their rudder was damaged in a portage. British paddlers, who were in second place, stopped to help the Danes fix it. The Danes went on to defeat the British by one second in an event that lasted nearly three hours. But there's a happy ending to this story too. According to The Wall Street Journal, the British kayakers won what many people regard as the highest honor in sports. They became the winner of the Pierre de Coubertin International Fair Play Trophy. The trophy is named for the founder of the modern Olympic Games, and it has been awarded annually for some time now to people in sports who have demonstrated nobility of spirit. It is big news in Europe, but it has not been given much recognition in the United States. In the past, the trophy has gone to a Hungarian tennis player who pleaded with officials to give his opponent more time to recover from a cramp, and to a high school basketball coach who forfeited the Georgia (US) state championship after he found out that one of his players was scholastically ineligible.

The first trophy went to an Italian bobsledder named Eugenio Monti for a gesture that exhibited a touch of class. In the two-man bobsled event at the 1964 Innsbruck Olympics, Monti was the leader after his final run. The only one given a chance to beat him was Tony Nash of Great Britain. As Nash and his teammate got ready for their final run, they discovered that a critical bolt on their sled had snapped at the last moment. Monti was informed of the problem and immediately took the corresponding bolt from his own sled and sent it up to Nash. Nash fixed his sled, came hurtling down the course to set a record and won the gold medal. What a great act of kindness by Monti!

All these acts however, pale into insignificance when we think of how kind God has been to us. It tells us in the Bible in John 3:16, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." The bobsledder Monti gave a bolt so that someone else could win a sports event that meant so much to them, but God gave so much more, He gave His Son so that all those who believe in Him might go to heaven. But the Bible shows us quite clearly, heaven is only for those who believe. What does it mean to believe in Jesus?

It means first of all, that you are sorry for all you've ever done to make God unhappy and angry. We make Him angry and sad when we don't live as He wants us to. He gave us the Ten Commandments to show us how we ought to live but nobody except Jesus has ever been able to live their life fully meeting God's requirements.

That means that all we really deserve is to be punished by God. But God is so loving and kind that He made a way for those who are truly sorry for not meeting His standard to be forgiven and that way is Jesus. On the cross, Jesus was punished by God for the sin of all those who turn to Him to be saved. How kind is that? Jesus was willing to be punished by God His Father in the place of all those who repent of their sin and trust in Him. So, secondly, believing in Jesus, means to trust that it is Him, who through His death on the cross, has brought you into a right relationship with God.

What a great act of kindness! We are the ones who don't play fair, we don't follow God's rules, but Jesus did and yet, He was prepared to be punished so that those who trust in Him might win the prize, the wonderful prize of eternal life! Have you repented of your sin and trusted in Jesus?

Let's hope the UK does very well and brings home many medals but let's never forget the prize that is available to all who trust in Jesus, the prize worth far more than the gold, silver or bronze of the medals, the infinite prize of eternal life.
