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Historically, the 48th FW has been the foundation of USAFE's combat capability and remains so today. The Liberty Wing led the EI Dorado Caryon roids into Libyu in 1986 and was the first F-111 fighter unit to deploy to the Gulf during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. The Liberty Wing also anchored NATO forces during Operations Deliberate Force and Allied Force. Since September 11, 2001, the 48th FW has played a key role in antiterrorism operations, flying combat missions, and providing combat support in Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqui Freedom.

WEST ROW BOYS WW1 TOUR

West Row Historical Society took thirty five members of the community over to the battlefields of the Western Front, following in the footsteps of the West Row Boys who served in the Great War, some returning to the village, others dying for their country in the conflict.

On the first day we were over there, Friday the 27th of September, we visited the Loos Battlefields, seeing where the Suffolk battalions were in action in the September of 1915 before making a stop in Poperinge behind the lines' for some rest and relaxation at Talbot House. It was then off to Estaires Communal Cemetery to lay a posy for our first West Row Boy of the trip, Augustus Isaac Ford, who died in a Casualty Clearing Station that was situated in the town. Our last stop of the day was to lay a posy for Jack Crick, the first West Row Boy to be killed in the Great War

Day two we were off to the Somme, seeing relics and learning more about the history of the Battle of the Somme at Musee Somme in Albert, it was then off to Thiepval Memorial, laying posies for Moore Webb and Ernest Rix, who were killed in action during the Battle of the Somme in 1916, the first West Row Boys of our visit to have no known grave. After lunch at Avril Williams' Guest House, a First Aid Post during the battle, it was on to Pozieres Memorial where we laid posies for George Ingle and Charles King who were killed in action during the German Spring Offensive of 1918. We then made a stop at Delville Wood to see where the 2nd Suffolks had been fighting in the August of 1916 before we made our way to High Wood. Here we laid James Stone's posy, as although he is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial, he was actually killed in the area of the wood. The next stop was Guillemont Road Cemetery where we visited Walter Ford and Arthur Brown, Arthur having been killed during the attack on Delville Wood. And our last stop of the day was to Serre Road Cemetery No. 2, to visit the grave of Frederick Prentice, who was killed in action along side Ernest Rix, who we had visited earlier in the day, the two of them having been killed during the Battle of Flers Courcellette, in which the very first tanks were used.

Day three saw us on the Ypres Salient, our first stop being to Ploegsteert Memorial, laying a posy each for Arthur Stone and Arthur King, who were both killed in the earlier months of 1918. Stop two was a visit to the grave of Sims Reeve at Railway Dugouts, Reeve having been killed during a working party in the early months of 1917. We then visited Tyne Cott, the largest Commonwealth War Grave Cemetery in the World, laying a posy each for Benjamin Aves and Richard Aves, who were killed in action during the Third Battle of Ypres and John Balls, one of our youngest West Row Boys at just 19, who was killed in the day to day trench life, having spent just 34 days in France. After Tyne Cott we took a visit to the Memorial Museum Passchendaele, learning more about life on the Salient and what happened during the famous battle of Passchendaele before heading to Hooge Crater Museum for lunch. After lunch it was then on to Brandhoek New Military Cemetery to lay a posy for Charles Taylor, a member of the Royal Field Artillery who was killed in the lead up to the Third Battle of Ypres, dying at a Casualty Clearing Station in late July 1917. Our last stop of the day saw us in Ypres, in which we visited In Flanders Field Museum located in the Cloth Hall before having some free time around the city, finishing the day with seeing the Last Post Ceremony beneath the Menin Gate at eight o'clock.


Our final day on the Western Front saw us on the battlefields of Cambrai and Arras, our first stop being Cambrai Memorial, where we laid posies for Claud Cobbold and James Smith, both of whom were killed during the Battle of Cambrai in 1917.



Our next stop saw us visit the tiny cemetery of Ecoust-St- Mein British Cemetery, laying a posy for George Leonard who was killed in the August of 1918 during the Advance to Victory. The final stop of our trip was to Arras Memorial, where we laid posies for three West Row Boys, William Mendham and Henry Palmer who were killed in action during the Battle of Arras, and to Albert Turner, who was killed in action during the German Spring Offensive.

In all, West Row sent 163 men to fight in the Great War, from all different ages and backgrounds, thirty six of them failing to return to the village after the Armistice. The purpose of the tour was to remember the West Row Boys, killed or survived, and I hope, with our small gesture of thanks, we were able to remember them in a way that would make them proud.







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
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

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

AROUND THE ALLOTMENTS IN NOVEMBER & DECEMBER



We hope everyone made the most of the lovely warm start to September but it didn't last long before the wet weather returned. The rain has again made for difficult conditions on the allotments and wellies have been an essential accessory for keeping feet dry. Hopefully by the time this is printed we've had enough dry weather to be able to tidy up the allotments and to turn over the soil ready for the new growing year. The nights are drawing in fast with the shortest day on 21st December which means that although allotment working time is reduced, it is still a good idea to have a general clear up, clean tools and equipment and carry out maintenance work for the coming year.

November is a good time to plant crops such as garlic, onion sets, raspberries, gooseberries and rhubarb crowns whilst at the same time harvesting winter veg such as cabbages, cauliflowers and turnips. Bare-root fruit trees such as apple, pear and cherry can also be set in November which gives them the chance to have a full growing season when temperatures start to rise in the springtime. It's also a good time to lift mint roots and divide them, these can be placed and grown in pots which can help stop the mint plant spreading too far. Smaller pots can be placed on a sunny window-cill for use over winter.

Broad beans can be sown in November which will give an earlier crop for the end of next spring. Beetroot can be left in the ground to be harvested in the winter and carrots can also be left in the ground until you are ready to use them. Alternatively, they can be stored in boxes layered in sand or compost and kept frost free and dark. Hardy spring onions and salad leaves can be set for cropping in both winter and spring but these need to be protected in a greenhouse or polytunnel.



If you've stored apples and pears in boxes remember to check regularly to make sure none have rotted or they will contaminate the rest of the crop. Chairman Alan has tried an alternative method to preserve pears by storing in sugar syrup and instructions can be found at www.deliciousmagazine.co.uk/recipes/syrup-preserved-pears/. Cooking apples such as Bramley's, which have been cored and filled with brown sugar and sultanas or raisins make for a lovely baked apple dessert in the winter.

Come December there are still several crops to be harvested including the essential Christmas dinner sprouts along with leeks, swedes and parsnips. all of which can be frozen for use later in the year. Don't forget to protect less hardy crops such as beans, lettuces and radishes from the frosts with a fleece or something similar. A tasty recipe for using onions and leeks for Christmas dinner stuffing balls can be found at www.bbcgoodfood.com/recipes/sage-leek-onion-balls.

"Learn from yesterday, live for today, hope for tomorrow." Albert Einstein

As we commemorate Remembrance Day 2024, we look back eighty years. The allied forces were deep into occupied Europe – knocking on the doors of Germany itself from both West and East and the tide in the Pacific well and truly turned.

How different things looked three and four years earlier, when the UK battled on its own, and although the German planes had been defeated and the danger of invasion less imminent, things seemed very dark indeed.

What keeps us going when times are tough, and problems seem overwhelming? Hope. Hope helps us carry on – that things will be different. Hope energises and encourages – that our actions will make a difference. Hope motivates us - that evil and darkness can be overcome. Hope is not a feeling, but a spur to action, an inspiration to build a better world. Hope is lighting the candle despite the dark storm swirling.

As I write, our world seems to have many dark storms swirling – the ongoing carnage in the Ukraine and the conflict in Israel/Palestine/Lebanon, let alone the ever increasing impact of global warming.

We have inherited the fruit of the hope of those who fought in WW2, that the evil of Nazism and the Japanese Empire could be defeated. Where do we find hope in the face of the dark storms of today, that will bear fruit for future generations?

For Christians, hope is not found in an emotion, but a person – Jesus. That when we come to know his good news he can bring hope to our lives, and by transforming us, bring hope and healing to our world. (That's why almost all food banks in the UK were set up by Christians – to bring hope and healing to those suffering from poverty.)

I believe that despite the dark storms that face our world now, we can still have hope, and that God intends each one of us to know that hope for ourselves.

So that's why I'd like to invite you to join us:

At the Remembrance Commemorations on the 9th and 10th November at 10.45 at the War Memorial. At the Christmas services at St. Peter's: Our Carol service on Sunday 22nd December at 6pm and our Christmas Communion service on Christmas Eve at 11:30pm.

To find hope for yourself by joining our three week Hope Explored Course starting at St. Peter's on Tuesdays 7th, 14th and 21st at 9.15am.

From the Pastor's Desk

The story is told of Shah Abbis, a Persian monarch who loved his people very much. To know and understand them better, he would mingle with his subjects in various disguises. One day he went as a poor man to the public baths and in a tiny cellar sat beside the fireman who attended the furnace. When it was mealtime, the monarch shared his coarse food and talked to his lonely subject as a friend.

Again and again, he visited and the man grew to love him. One day the Shah told him he was the monarch, expecting the man to ask for some gift from him. But the fireman said gazing at his ruler with love and wonder and at last spoke, "You left your palace in your glory to sit with me in this dark place, to eat of my coarse food, to care whether my heart is glad or sorry. On others you may bestow rich presents, but to me you have given yourself, and it only remains for me to pray that you never withdraw the gift of your friendship."

This is a very touching story that reminds us that Jesus, whose birth we celebrate at Christmas, left the glories of heaven in order to share himself with us. That gift of his love and friendship will never be withdrawn from those who acknowledge who He is, why He came and trust that He is the only one who can make them right with God.

The Bible tells us so clearly in Matthew 1:21 why Jesus had to come into the world. It says, "She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." Our world and our hearts are shrouded by the darkness of sin. Sin is our failure to conform perfectly to the moral law of God in act, attitude, or nature. Yes, our nature, the internal character of who we as people are, is also sinful – we are born with an inclination to sin. This is so evident in humans from an early age. Children do not need to be taught to be naughty and disobedient, it just comes naturally. Children need to be taught to be good and as they grow up and mature into adults it becomes only too clear that nobody is perfect, we are all sinners. God tells us this in the Bible too. In Romans 3:23 we read, "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."

God is holy, just, righteous and loving yet because of who He is He also exhibits a pure wrath against all that is sinful and unholy! Due to the inability of man to conform perfectly to His moral law, God graciously redeems sinners (makes sinners right with Him) through the atoning sacrifice of His Son. All sin has to be punished, it cannot be swept under the carpet, God's wrath has to be appeased, each and every sin of His people who have ever lived and who are still to live has to be punished.

We are incapable of satisfying God's demands for justice except by spending eternity in hell and the only sacrifice that could be made to restore the relationship between God and man had to be made by God Himself. It was for that reason that God, in human flesh, Jesus, bore God's wrath upon the cross to the end—until the very last sin of all those who would ever turn to Him as Saviour was accounted for and punished—then he cried out— "*it is finished*." His work of redeeming "*his people*" was finished! That sacrifice made by Jesus was paid for in His own blood. His blood was shed so that you and I, if we trust in Him as our saviour and Lord, enter into a right relationship with God. Again, we read in the Bible in Romans 5:8, "*God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us*."

Jesus came to dispel the darkness of sin and bring sinners into the glorious light of God's love. I trust this Christmas that the light of Christ may fill your heart and your home and bring peace, joy and hope to you and your loved ones. Jesus is indeed the Light of the World!

West Row Academy is on the up



It's so true that one's reputation can be ruined in an instant whilst it takes years to build and maintain a good one. What is true for people is also true for organisations and that includes schools. Over the last decade or so, the reputation of West Row Academy has suffered, and it has been seen in a negative light by parents and many others in the community. The challenge the Academy faces is to drive through the required improvements necessary to turn that perception around so that the whole village speaks well of the school. Whilst many improvements can be implemented quickly, perceptions take much longer to change and everyone at West Row Academy is determined to see that happen.

The last two Ofsted inspection grades were "Requires Improvement" which meant that the school had to join a new Trust, the body that has overall responsibility for the school and its performance. Unity Schools Partnership (USP) were chosen due to their excellent reputation of guiding struggling schools through the initial improvement cycle and then ensuring they remain good performing schools. West Row Academy has been part of USP for just over a year now and the improvements that have taken place so far are astonishing. There is some way to go still but the Head Teacher, Mrs Close, the Senior Leadership Team and all the staff together with their colleagues at USP have worked tirelessly this past year to turn things round.

As Chair of Governors, I have seen first-hand the improvements that have been made and I would just like to highlight a few of the successes.

Last year's Year Six pupils have to be congratulated on their excellent results. They performed admirably in their end of year SATs tests and for the first time for quite a while the overall results were above the national average. They were also a vast improvement on the previous two years results. Last academic year, the results indicated that 63% of Year 6 pupils were moving to secondary school at or above the required standard. The national average was 61%. Mrs Close, all the staff and pupils are to be congratulated as the previous two year's results were 22% and 9% respectively. The improvement has been phenomenal! The results for disadvantaged pupils have also improved above expectation. Last year it was 66.7% whilst the previous two year's were 13% and 11% respectively.

Secondly, because of the pace of improvement and the dedication of all staff, West Row Academy has been entrusted with managing a Specific Learning Disabilities Unit (SLD). It officially opened its doors on the 16th of September and has been named Panda Class. It demonstrates the Academy's and the Trust's dedication to provide inclusive and supportive education for all children

This unit has been fully funded by the local authority and no funds will be moved to support it from other parts of the school.

The final success is the amazing partnership and teamwork that has developed between the Academy and the Trust. Unity Schools Partnership have invested heavily in the school. Information Technology provision has improved and, in almost all Key Stage 2 classes, each pupil has their own iPad on which to work. Information Technology is now an important enabler of learning. The Trust's renowned and highly respected curriculum, CUSP, has also been implemented across the school



and experienced Unity staff are on site virtually every week to mentor, guide and provide training where necessary.

West Row Academy is on the way up but nobody is resting on their laurels. The school values of Curiosity, Kindness, Resilience, Inclusion, Integrity and Passion have certainly been demonstrated by staff and pupils alike in the amazing turnaround to date. This said, there remains much to do, and we sincerely hope that the

improvements will soon be recognised in our community. For those of you who are still sceptical and who are perhaps using social media to share your opinion I would really like to invite you to consider getting involved in the amazing transformation that is happening before our very eyes. We still have some vacancies for Community Governors on the Governing Board and would be thrilled if you volunteered to help drive up standards and change the perception that so many have of the school.
