



Thank you for reading this article in the great Parish Magazine.

Previously Lance Stansbury wrote a regular article, and the editor has asked if I would like to contribute, and I am pleased to do so. I am the County Councillor for Row Heath Division on Suffolk County Council and have been honoured to represent the village for several years. I know West Row well and have lived in the area all my life.

As usual, our very patchy! Summer continues, but it always amazes me how much there is to do in West Row. The village offers an array of vibrant facilities and projects that have become synonymous with community spirit. From the innovative "Shed Project" to the bustling Village Hall and the cherished Bowls Club, West Row shines as a hub of togetherness, providing residents and visitors with great opportunities to enjoy the facilities.

At the County Council, it is a time to work hard on the potholes, using the recently announced £10M extra that Suffolk County Council is spending to complete as many repairs as possible before the damaging frosts of our winters.

September, as a County Council, is the time we start the process of looking at the budget for next year, from April 2024 to April 2025. Protecting vital services without putting up your hard-earned Council Tax by more than is absolutely needed is always a tricky balance. But we search out every possible savings, leaving no stone unturned, and devise new ways to work to achieve this without cutting vital services to the most vulnerable in our villages.

It's also a time of year when we start to plan for the months ahead as food, energy, and mortgage costs rise; there is help with the Cost of Living, and it is well worth you seeing what support is available at www.suffolk.gov.uk/CostOfLiving

Don't forget I have a small local budget to help support projects and groups across Row Heath, so please get in touch.

I am also here to help you with local issues and problems with services provided by Suffolk County Council. So if you have any issues or concerns, you can always call or email me, and I will do my best to help.

PARISH NEWS



GRASS CUTTING: Suffolk County Council (SCC) are responsible for specific areas, rights of way and other paths, but funding has seriously hampered their workload. We will continue to keep our village neat and tidy thanks to local farmers and conscientious residents who maintain public areas. We thank everyone for unselfishly doing their bit.

PATHS: Please remember, residents/landlords are responsible for keeping the vegetation away from public paths. Allowing vegetation to impact on the width of our paths, severely impacts the safety of users, such as children, pushchairs, mobility scooters and general enjoyment of pedestrians.

CEMETERY: Cllr Peachey continues his excellent work towards the Parish securing our own cemetery. We are in negotiations with the developer and SCC towards a mutual agreement which will be made public in due course.

PUBLIC FOOTPATHS: Work continues to improve Shop Drove, also between the entry point at Church Road/Eldo Road leading to Chapel Road, plus the Bridleway towards Mildenhall. We thank those residents who help keep these areas clear for all to use safely and easily.

COMMUNITY ASSETS: Another project ongoing is the security of facilities within the parish which are deemed an asset to the community and any potential loss would impact on resident's health and well-being. As such, we have to date secured Judes Ferry PH and The Shed community garden. Work is in progress for other facilities we would not wish to lose.

100 CLUB: Please consider signing up to the Parish Echo 100 Club, it is only £12 per year and helps pay towards The Echo. Got to be In It To Win It. Each household receives a copy with details of events. A vital lifeline for those not on social media. Contact the Parish Clerk for further details.

AROUND THE ALLOTMENTS IN SEPTEMBER & OCTOBER



Hopefully everyone has been able to enjoy a good summer despite the awful wet weather we've had for most of July and into August. On the allotments, unfortunately, the plants that have really enjoyed and benefitted from all the rain and warm ground are the weeds which seem to have gone berserk. This has made keeping on top of hoeing and maintaining the allotments very hard work this summer!



As we get into autumn, September and October are good harvest months for crops such as potatoes, runner beans and beetroot. Many of these crops can be sweetcorn, late frozen or preserved for use later in the year. Although a little time consuming, sweetcorn can be stripped from the core and frozen loosely in bags. More information about preserving vegetables and fruit can be found online at websites similar to the one

available here:https://www.allotment-garden.org/recipe/freezing-produce/freeze-information-blanching/

September and October will also see several varieties of apples and pears ready to harvest. Wild blackberries are usually about in early September and it's also time for picking sloes which make a lovely warming sloe gin or sloe vodka and recipes can be found online such as this one at the GoodFood website https:// www.bbcgoodfood.com/recipes/sloe-gin. Walnuts are usually ready to be picked at the end of September and can be stored and eaten over the winter period. Melons should be ready

for picking late August/early September depending on the variety, one of our allotment holders has grown cucamelons this year (also known as little mouse watermelons) which are good for salads, pickling and salsas.

It's a good time to pot any runners from strawberry plants into individual pots to make strong plants ready for next summer and these should be planted out again by November (before it gets too cold). Runners from raspberry canes can be planted directly into the ground for healthy new plants, again ready for next summer's harvesting.

Winter greens such as cabbages and cauliflowers should be planted by mid-September at the latest ready for harvesting just after Christmas. It is still early enough to plant some radishes and lettuces for a late crop, depending on the weather, and this usually take around 8 to 10 weeks to grow. It's also a good idea to try and get some ground turned over before winter ready for the next planting season and, as always, to keep on top of the weeds and cleaning as much as possible.

Halloween will be upon us at the end of October and pumpkins should be picked in the first couple weeks of October, sometimes earlier. Not only are they great for decorating but pumpkins can also be turned into winter warming soups and pies.

With any luck we will have seen a lovely warm end of August along with some sunny weather and hopefully September and October will be nice and warm to make up for the very wet and unseasonal start to the summer we've had.

From the Pastor's Desk

In George Orwell's literary classic 1984, the population of the totalitarian state, Oceana, are kept under control by the governing party lead by its leader, Big Brother through the Thought Police and continual surveillance.

When we look at the society we live in today, it seems as if we are really heading that way too, but we are still way behind regimes like China where its citizens are kept under constant surveillance through CCTV, mobile phone data and all the other data mined about each citizen of the country.

Yet, let's not be fooled ... even in the UK, CCTV, face recognition technology, mobile phones, data harvesting and the like look into our lives like never before. GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations) have been brought in to protect our privacy but even this is failing to protect our anonymity!

If we want to protect our space and our privacy, we must live off the national grid, use cash and not credit and debit cards, never venture onto the internet and throw our mobile phones away. Even then CCTV, ring doorbells and the like in our towns and cities will pick us up and the latest face recognition software may identify us.

Yet, all the best efforts of companies, organizations and the government to try to know everything there is to know about us pales into insignificance when compared to what God knows about each and every one of us. He has complete knowledge. The Lord knows everything about you and everything about me. The Psalmist also knew this to be true over 3000 years ago and that is why He could write (Psalm 139:2) "*You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from afar*."

This has massive implications for us because we are God's creation and He has told us how we ought to live our lives, but we have all failed to meet His requirements. We have all missed the mark. We have all sinned against our Maker. God's Word tells us in Psalm 53:3b, "*there is none who does good, not even one*" and in the NT we read in Romans 3:23, "*all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God*." We sin every day of our lives and God sees it all and knows all about it. John the Apostle highlights this when he writes in his first letter 1 John 1:8, "*If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us*."

Now this may not be easy for some readers to stomach, but the truth of the matter is that we all struggle with sin! We sin because every one of us is a sinner.

A young boy and his father were walking in an apple orchard. The father pulled an apple from a tree, cupping his hands around it, asked his son what he saw. The son replied, "A beautiful red apple. May I have it?" The father handed the apple to the boy for examination. The boy touched it and immediately dropped it. Why? Because the apple appeared to be perfect only when viewed from one side. You see, on the other side it had been attacked by an insect and was rotten throughout. Yet, the skin on the first side still had wholeness. All people are like that apple. We may appear to be beautiful and wholesome, but, once we examine ourselves thoroughly, we see that we are rotten and marred because of our sinful nature.

It's for this reason that forgiveness of sin is one of the greatest blessings imaginable! The God who knows everything there is to know about us, who knows all about our sin is also the God who forgives sin. Many in the world today are burdened with crippling debt, they worry and spend sleepless nights thinking about how they are ever going to manage to pay their debts off – the worry is debilitating! Well ... having your sin





forgiven is far better than having all your debt paid off no matter how large!

When God forgives, he wipes your slate clean, your debt is cleared ... and God is so, so gracious ... your sin will not ever be brought up again ... that is why the Psalmist could write what he does in Psalm 32:1-2,

"Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered. Blessed is the man against whom the Lord counts no iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no deceit" and also what he does in Psalm 103:12, "as far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our transgressions from us."

God tells us in 1 John 1:9. "*If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness*." Are you weighed down by the burden of your sin? Do you realise you have offended God? Well, there is hope for you. Come to God, confess your sin before him and trust that your sin is forgiven in Jesus. He paid the price for it when God punished Him on the cross in your place.

I trust as you repent you will feel the blessing of forgiveness and that your life will be completely turned around.

Every morning I get ready for my warm and comfortable ride to school. The journey is about four miles and takes about an hour to come and go. The driver is Mr. Jack Ingle. It is a four wheeled wag-on with a top that can be removed easily.

Inside there are three long forms, of which one is moveable. The colour inside is dark red and pale yellow. The number of children, when they are all there is about twenty to twenty one. The wagon is drawn by two of Mr. Ingle's horses.

Has anyone in the village any further information to add to this with written records or photographs that could be published?

The Roman Villa – by Joan Rolfe & Beryl Norman

Would you think that on the borders of the fen there are remains of a British Roman villa?

There is one on Mr. Fred Rolfe's premises. While Mr. Rolfe has been ploughing his land at different times he has found one part of it different from the other. One day last year while ploughing his land, his plough shear turned up some red flat tiles which are not used today. On digging down further he found the remains of the foundations of a large Roman house.

In it he found a Roman stove which they used to heat centrally the houses. Also they found some shells of oysters, of which the Romans were very fond.

No further discovery has been attempted, as digging has stopped until the authorities can find time to excavate the site properly.
