


Hello, and thank you for reading my column in this great Parish magazine. As I write this article, we are having an early taste of summer, and fingers crossed it bodes well for a long, dry Summer ahead.

A few weeks ago, in other parts of the Country, we had local elections for County Councils. Here, these were suspended as Suffolk is part of the government's first phase of local government reorganisation and the creation of a new combined authority for Norfolk and Suffolk. There will also be directly elected Mayoral elections in May 2026, who can sit at the top table of the new mayoral structure that the Labour Government requires.



The process is called Devolution, which aims to transfer decision-making powers from the central government to local authorities. In the case of Norfolk and Suffolk, this involves the creation of a combined authority across our two counties. The combined authority will oversee critical areas such as strategic transport, housing, skills development, and economic growth. The goal is to give our area greater control over resources and decisions directly affecting our community. This should enable more tailored solutions to affordable housing, sustainable transport, and job creation while unlocking additional government funding for local projects.

In parallel, local government reorganisation is underway, with proposals to replace the current county and district councils with a single or two unitary authorities for Suffolk. Norfolk and Suffolk have long operated under a two-tier system, where county councils manage services like Adult social care, Children's support and protection services, education and highways. In contrast, district councils oversee bin collection, housing and planning. However, the shift to unitary authorities promises a more efficient, simplified structure. Instead of multiple layers of governance, a single authority in each area would handle all local government functions. This change could reduce duplication, lower costs, and make services more accessible to residents. With elections to these new councils probably in May 2027.

Critics argue that reorganisation risks losing smaller councils' local knowledge and community focus, but proponents highlight the opportunity to deliver services more effectively and equitably across the County. The new structure could also strengthen Norfolk and Suffolk's national voice, ensuring our rural and coastal priorities are heard.

While reorganisation and Devolution bring challenges, they also present a unique opportunity to shape a stronger, more responsive system of governance. We can ensure these changes benefit West Row with collaboration and community involvement.

Let us embrace this transformation with optimism and determination to build a brighter future for our County.

I am always looking for ways to help the village and improve services. As well as deal with problems that might occur with a service provided by Suffolk County Council. So, if you have any issues or concerns, you can always call or email me, and I will do my best to help.

I do hope you have a great summer.

The 48th Fighter Wing – also known as the Liberty Wing - is located at RAF Lakenheath and RAF Feltwell. Consisting of more than 5,000 U.S. military members, over 1,500 British and U.S. civilians, and around 8,500 dependents, it is the largest U.S.-operated Air Force base in the United Kingdom and home to both F-15E and F-35A fighter jets. Current priorities for the 48th Fighter Wing include doubling our F-35A fleet by 2024 and providing balance for our

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
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
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WEST ROW BOWLS CLUB NEWS

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My Uncle Wally only had his thumb and little finger on his left hand. His other fingers had been cut off about halfway down. When I got old enough to ask why, he showed me a copy of Eagle magazine (if memory serves) in storage which told his story and therefore told me why, without him having to go into detail. He had been serving in the Burma Campaign when he had met a Japanese officer, who got out his sword and sliced his fingers off in the fight.

This wound didn't hold him back, he continued to serve in the war, and after the war he raised a family and had jobs. He was good at making things and was a great mechanic. He even welded a seat in one of my early rather ropy cars. He didn't mention the war, it was just my childish questions about his hand that prompted his answer.

As we have been planning the events to commemorate VJ Day here in West Row, it will come as no surprise that memories of Uncle Wally, his hand, and that comic strip have come back to mind.

His hand was a very visible and constant reminder for him, and for us who knew his story, of the horrors and service that was the reality of life for those who served in the war against Japan. But only he knew the other, personal memories of comrades lost, of horrors experienced, and of the fighting that only ended when Japan surrendered on 15th August.

That's why I'm grateful to be able to be involved in the VJ Day events here, and why the decision to particularly focus on VJ day is so important. It's so easy for us to think that the war finished in May and so forget Uncle Wally and the others like him for who served in the campaigns against Japan. By commemorating VJ Day we can include both those who served in the East and those whose war finished in May.

As we gather together in the events this August, whether those celebratory or more sombre, I will give thanks for Uncle Wally and for the many others whose names and stories I will never know, and for their willingness to fight against evil and continue fighting until it was defeated.

It may be eighty years since those days, but it is so important to remember. To remember the cost, and as we remember to resolve to do differently. As George Santayana said 120 years ago "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

From the Pastor's Desk

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As I sit at my desk and draft this article, we have just celebrated Victory in Europe (VE) day in the village and in the country. The very first VE Day, celebrated on May 8, 1945, marked the end of World War II in Europe. It was a day of immense joy, relief, and hope as the Allied forces declared victory over Nazi Germany. The streets were filled with jubilant crowds, and the world breathed a collective sigh of relief. This historic day can serve as a powerful illustration of Christ's second coming and the lasting peace He will bring.

Just as VE Day signified the end of a long and brutal conflict, Christ's second coming will mark the end of all suffering, pain, and strife. The Bible tells us that Jesus will return to establish His kingdom on earth, bringing with Him a reign of peace and righteousness. In Revelation 21:4, we read, " *He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain any more, for the former things have passed away.*" This promise of a new era, free from the burdens of the past, vastly outshines the hope and renewal that VE Day brought to a war-weary world.

The celebrations on VE Day were a foretaste of the joy and unity that will be experienced when Christ returns. People from all walks of life came together to celebrate the end of the war, much like the diverse multitude that will gather to worship Jesus in His kingdom. Revelation 7:9 describes this scene: "After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude that no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb." 

Not sure why the Easter Bunny is looking so worried Carol ???? He loved all the carrots given him that he will def. be back next year.






